Our hope is to add a Director of Outreach and Engagement to our staff, among other plans, and we are asking for your support.

We're grateful to the parish leaders and staff who have already made their financial commitments for 2025; **as of Wednesday, we had 91 pledges totaling \$603.832**. This initial group includes **100 percent participation by the vestry and clergy**.

'God's American Purpose' series resumes today

The four-part series "God's American Purpose" led by the Rev. William Sachs continues today. Bill is joined by **Robert Wilson-Black** for a conversation about faith amid national conflict. We will use Parker Palmer's book, recently reissued, *Healing the Heart of Democracy*. Rob is a graduate of the University of Richmond with a PhD from the University of Chicago under adviser Martin Marty. Having served for a decade as CEO of Sojourners, then CEO of John Lewis' Faith & Politics Institute, he left to co-found the National Museum of American Religion.

Next Sunday, November 3, two days before national elections, several of our clergy will address the forum as a panel. Recalling the book, *Common Faith*, by John Dewey, we will consider how common purpose might arise from difference and division. We are a people of common prayer, to which all are welcome. We believe that "God's American Purpose" begins with common prayer, here at St. Stephen's and beyond.

All Saints' Day service

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 1 | NOON

On All Saints' Day, a major day in the church calendar, we remember and celebrate the Communion of Saints, including all those whom we love but see no longer. We pray with special intention for those who have died in the past year. A service of Holy Eucharist is held at noon on November 1, and all are invited, not just those who are remembering someone who has died recently.

Vestry nomination process begins

SUGGESTIONS DUE BY NOVEMBER 17

In the Episcopal Church, an elected body called a vestry tends to the temporal matters of the church in cooperation with the rector. Six new vestry members are elected at an annual parish meeting so that the total vestry (ours numbers 18) is continually rotating in new members to work with continuing ones. Prior to the annual meeting, parishioners are invited to submit names for consideration by a nominating committee. This committee is appointed by the vestry and consists of at-large members as well as the six members of the vestry who will complete their service with the next annual parish meeting. The nominating committee co-chairs this year are Brenda McDowell and Andy Luke.

The committee will be looking for a diversity of nominees, including men and women of different ages, those who have been at St. Stephen's a long time and those who are newer to this community, those who worship at different services on Sunday, those who are involved in different ministries, those who would bring different gifts, skills, and perspectives to the vestry.
