Welcome!

We couldn't be more thrilled that you have joined us for this special occasion of faith, hope, and love.

Whether you've come from far and wide or have lived in Richmond your whole life; whether you're closer to Will F. or Will S.; whether you're a longtime churchgoer or enter this sacred space today for the first time: we are honored by your presence. Thank you for joining us on this transformational day in our life together. This service encapsulates many of our shared values: our Episcopal faith, our passion for music, and our love of family and friends.

We are grateful that three clergy close to us will share in the celebration and blessing of our marriage. J. Neil Alexander has been a mentor to Will S. since 2008, and later was the bishop who sent him to seminary. Janet Vincent served as rector of the parish where Will S's sense of call was first nurtured: St. Columba's Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C., and she remains a mentor and close family friend. John Rohrs is the rector here at St. Stephen's Church, and our cherished connection with him and his family is represented today by John preaching and two of his children serving as reader and acolyte.

Of course, we both share a devotion to music, which today takes "center stage." Two of Will F's very dear and longtime friends, Georgia Jarman and Brenda Patterson, sing arias by Handel, all of which have figured significantly throughout Will F's life and career. Franz Biebl's *Ave Maria* carries memories of Will F's time singing at St. Christopher's School, as it does for Will S. who sang it while a student at the American Boychoir School. *O How Amiable*, with its bold affirmation in the faithfulness of God to sustain us in times of joy and pain alike, was sung at Will S's ordination to the diaconate in 2014. The first of three choral anthems today, "God so loved the world," comes from Sir John Stainer's *The Crucifixion*, an oratorio Will F. has sung several times at The Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City. Leading those performances was The Brick's Minister of Music, Keith Tóth, a mutual friend of ours and the person who introduced us to each other. We wish also to offer special thanks to our treasured friend and colleague Jeffrey Riehl who assembled and leads our outstanding choir today.

And because singing together is a powerful act of unity and joy, we have great hymns! Each is significant to us in different ways: *Hyfrydol* for Will S., *Sine Nomine* for Will F. (again, from St. Christopher's School), and *Slane* which is especially meaningful to Will S's mother Kathleen. *I Am the Bread of Life* was an early point of connection for us as it figures prominently at Easter at both St. James' in New York, where Will F. sang in the choir, and All Saints' in Beverly Hills, where Will S. served as Associate Rector. It proclaims the power of resurrection so resolutely that many often feel inspired to "raise up" their own arms and hands on the refrain. You are free to participate in this less-than-characteristically Episcopal act of witness, should you think it meet and right so to do ©. The harmonization and descant for the final verse of *Abbot's Leigh* was created by our great friend Patrick Scott, who serves as one of Will S's attendants. Please make a joyful noise and sing out!

Finally, instead of reciting a psalm, we will hear a new musical setting of Psalm 133, *Ecce quam bonum*. This psalm serves as the motto for The University of the South, Will S's alma mater. Its joyful message extolling the rightness and beauty of brethren living together in unity resonates with us on many fronts. We are incredibly grateful to our beloved friend, the fiercely talented Matt Boehler, for his inspired piece composed especially for today's service.

Thank you again for being here and sharing in this happy day. Your presence and love mean the world to us.



Bishop Alexander

Dearly beloved: We have come together in the presence of God to witness and bless the joining together of Will and Will in Holy Matrimony. The joining of two people in a life of mutual fidelity signifies to us the mystery of the union between Christ and his Church, and so it is worthy of being honored among all people.

The union of two people in heart, body, and mind is intended by God for their mutual joy; for the help and comfort given one another in prosperity and adversity; and, when it is God's will, for the gift of children and their nurture in the knowledge and love of the Lord.

Therefore marriage is not to be entered into unadvisedly or lightly, but reverently, deliberately, and in accordance with the purposes for which it was instituted by God. Into this holy union William Hume Ferguson and William Smyth Stanley now come to be joined. If any of you can show just cause why they may not lawfully be married, speak now; or else for ever hold your peace.

Then the Bishop says to the persons to be married

I require and charge you both, here in the presence of God, that if either of you knows any reason why you may not be united in marriage lawfully, and in accordance with God's Word, you do now confess it.

The Declaration of Consent



The Marriage

Each member of the couple, in turn, takes the right hand of the other and says

In the Name of God, I, Will, take you, Will, to be my husband, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until we are parted by death. This is my solemn vow.

The Bishop asks God's blessing on the rings as follows

Bless, O Lord, these rings to be signs of the vows by which Will and Will have bound themselves to each other; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The giver places the ring on the ring finger of the other's hand and says

Will, I give you this ring as a symbol of my vow, and with all that I am, and all that I have, I honor you, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Will, I give you this ring as a symbol of my vow, and with all that I am, and all that I have, I honor you, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Then the Bishop joins the right hands of the couple and says

Now that Will and Will have given themselves to each other by solemn vows, with the joining of hands and the giving and receiving of rings, I pronounce that they are wed to one another, in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Those whom God has joined together let no one put asunder.

The Prayers

The Assisting Priest reads the following prayers, to which the People respond, Amen.

Let us pray.

Eternal God, creator and preserver of all life, author of salvation, and giver of all grace: Look with favor upon the world you have made, and for which your Son gave his life, and especially upon Will and Will whom you make one flesh in Holy Matrimony. **Amen.**

Give them wisdom and devotion in the ordering of their common life, that each may be to the other a strength in need, a counselor in perplexity, a comfort in sorrow, and a companion in joy. **Amen.**

Grant that their wills may be so knit together in your will, and their spirits in your Spirit, that they may grow in love and peace with you and one another all the days of their life. **Amen.**

Give them grace, when they hurt each other, to recognize and acknowledge their fault, and to seek each other's forgiveness and yours. **Amen.**

Make their life together a sign of Christ's love to this sinful and broken world, that unity may overcome estrangement, forgiveness heal guilt, and joy conquer despair. **Amen.**

Bestow on them, if it is your will, the gift and heritage of children, and the grace to bring them up to know you, to love you, and to serve you. **Amen.**

Give them such fulfillment of their mutual affection that they may reach out in love and concern for others. Amen.

Grant that all married persons who have witnessed these vows may find their lives strengthened and their loyalties confirmed. **Amen.**

Grant that the bonds of our common humanity, by which all your children are united one to another, and the living to the dead, may be so transformed by your grace, that your will may be done on earth as it is in heaven; where, O Father, with your Son and the Holy Spirit, you live and reign in perfect unity, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Blessing of the Marriage

The People remain standing. The couple kneel, and the Bishop says the following prayer

Most gracious God, we give you thanks for your tender love in sending Jesus Christ to come among us, to be born of a human mother, and to make the way of the cross to be the way of life. We thank you, also, for consecrating the union of two people in his Name. By the power of your Holy Spirit, pour out the abundance of your blessing upon Will and Will. Defend them from every enemy. Lead them into all peace. Let their love for each other be a seal upon their hearts, a mantle about their shoulders, and a crown upon their foreheads. Bless them in their work and in their companionship; in their sleeping and in their waking; in their joys and in their sorrows; in their life and in their death. Finally, in your mercy, bring them to that table where your saints feast for ever in your heavenly home; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The couple still kneeling, the Bishop adds this blessing

God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you; the Lord mercifully with his favor look upon you, and fill you with all spiritual benediction and grace; that you may faithfully live together in this life, and in the age to come have life everlasting. **Amen.**





We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.





Bishop This is the table, not of the Church, but of the Lord. It is made ready for those who love him and for those who want to love him more. So, come, you who have much faith and you who have little, you who have been here often and you who have not been here long, you who have tried to follow and you who have failed. Come, because it is the Lord who invites you. It is his will that those who want him should meet him here.

At the Communion of the People

During the first anthem, the grooms and choir receive Communion at the high altar. After the aria, ministers will distribute Communion at the bottom of the chancel steps and in both side chapels. All are welcome at the altar in this place. The altar also extends to your pew if you need us to bring the sacrament to you; please let an usher know. To receive Communion, place your hands together, palms up. You may consume the bread and then drink from the wine in the larger chalice. If you prefer to "intinct" or touch the edge of your bread to the wine, please use one of the smaller cups, available at all stations. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request. If you prefer to receive a blessing, cross your arms across your chest.


