Abound in Hope: the annual giving campaign

In the fifteenth chapter of his letter to the Romans, the Apostle Paul writes, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." St. Stephen's mission is to live as a community of hospitality, healing, and hope, sharing the love of Christ. We are drawn in each week for worship and fellowship; then the Holy Spirit sends us out in love and compassion. Through it all, in Paul's words, we abound in hope.

We are deeply grateful to the 289 households who, as of Wednesday, had made pledges totaling \$1,295,024. This includes 19 pledges from families who attend the Palmer Hall service. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider the ways that St. Stephen's Church helps you abound in hope, and what you can do to make it possible for this church to bring hope to others. The Rev. Cate Anthony continues her Wednesday evening class following the midweek parish supper. The focus of the first two sessions is *Incarnational Mission: Being With the World* by the Rev. Sam Wells, examining the foundations of the "Being With" ethos. On November 19, the class will reflect on Dr. Wells' visit and lecture and imagine together how to live the theology of "Being With" in our lives today. No sign up is required for this class.

The Rev. Samuel Wells visits next Sunday and Monday

As part of the Week of Compassion, the Rev. Dr. Samuel Wells will visit St. Stephen's Church next Sunday, November 16, and Monday, November 17. Dr. Wells is vicar of St. Martin-in-the-Fields in London's Trafalgar Square, and a creator of the "Being With" approach we have used in small groups. Next Sunday, he will attend the Palmer Hall service at 9 a.m., speak in the Sunday Forum at 10:10 a.m., preach at the 11:15 a.m. service, and give the reflection during the 5:30 p.m. service of Celtic Evensong and Communion.

On Monday, he will give an address at a community-wide event in the church at 6:30 p.m., speaking about the theology and practice of Being With as a faithful and countercultural response to this moment in the life of the church and our country. We will reflect on the importance of compassion, empathy, and connection as an antidote to polarization and enmity. This free event will be followed by a reception. No registration is required.

Ways to help those experiencing food insecurity

With so much attention focused on food insecurity this fall, we want to remind you of some ways to support our food ministry for those in need.

In recent weeks we have seen a 33 percent increase in the number of households seeking our assistance to feed their families. At the same time, the items available for us to purchase form FeedMore (central Virginia's food bank) have been very limited. Fortunately, St. Stephen's Church receives generous weekly donations of shelf-stable food from parishioners, and fresh and perishable food (produce, eggs, meat, and other items) from vendors at our farmers market. You truly make a difference. Thank you.

The best way to help us meet the increasing demand is to continue to donate food. What if everyone who came to church on Sunday brought just two cans? There is always a list of needed items in the weekly **eSpirit**, but if you forget the list, just remember that we always need hearty soups, canned beans, and cans or pouches of tuna. If you wish to do more, shop in bulk at a store like Aldi, BJ's, or Costco. You can also order food online and have shelf-stable groceries shipped to church.

If you would like to give your time, on Wednesdays and Thursdays we need drivers mid-morning to deliver to those who cannot come to the pantry in person because they lack transportation, have a disability, or face other hurdles. SUGGESTIONS DUE BY NOVEMBER 23

In the Episcopal Church, each parish elects a vestry, a board composed of parishioners who work with the rector. Six new vestry members are elected at each annual parish meeting so that the total vestry of 18 is continually rotating in new members to work with continuing ones. Prior to the annual meeting, parishioners are invited to submit names for consideration by a nominating committee. This committee is appointed by the vestry and consists of at-large members as well as the six members of the vestry who will complete their service with the next annual parish meeting.

The committee looks for a diversity of nominees: those of different ages, long-time members and newer ones, those who worship at different services, are involved in a range of ministries, and offer varied gifts, skills, and perspectives.
