Schedule for Christmas II

The season of Christmas lasts until this Tuesday, January 6, the Epiphany. That means today is the Second Sunday of Christmas! As it was last Sunday, the schedule today is a bit different from our regular Sunday schedule. There is no Palmer Hall service, Sunday morning formation, Sunday supper, or Compline service today. All resume next Sunday, January 11. Today's services are:

Sunday Forum returns January 11 with a new series on contemplative life and ministry

SUNDAYS AT 10:10 A.M.

In a four-week Sunday Forum series leading up to the February 1 commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the first Celtic Evensong and Communion service at St. Stephen's Church, we will explore multiple dimensions of contemplative life and ministry: from foundational forms of prayer and meditation to spiritual direction, rules of life, labyrinth walking, and the central connection between contemplation and action.

The series begins next Sunday, January 11, with a focus on "The Contemplative Roots of the U.S. Civil Rights Movement." The Rev. Dr. J. Lee Hill, Jr., Canon for Racial Justice and Healing for the Diocese of Virginia, will speak about how such thinkers and practitioners as Howard Thurman and Mahatma Gandhi had a profound influence on the theology and practice of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. and other civil rights leaders. This opening forum reminds us that contemplation is not simply about the inner life, but about how we ground ourselves for faithful engagement with the world. Women of St. Stephen's program to focus on 'Art for the Journey'

Art for the Journey is a local organization dedicated to harnessing the transformative power of art to support those facing challenges, including illness, trauma, and loss. Through innovative programs and workshops, they provide a safe space for self-expression, healing, and connection for a variety of groups including women at The Lighthouse RVA, those who are incarcerated, veterans, and youth, including students at Anna Julia Cooper School. Art for the Journey has exhibited work by many of these groups in our gallery and café and they are recipients of grant support from the Women of St. Stephen's.

No registration is needed for this free program, but the Women of St. Stephen's will collect art supplies for Art for the Journey: baby wipes, paper towels, large clear Ziploc bags, colored pencils, 11×14 or 12×16 flat canvas boards, construction paper and paint brushes.

Wednesday suppers return this week; Sundays resume January 11

An Epiphany service of Lessons and Carols followed by supper

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 14 | 6 P.M.

January 6 marks the transition from the 12-day season of Christmas to the Epiphany, a feast of the church, and the beginning of the season that lasts until Ash Wednesday and Lent. As part of our celebration of this feast, on January 14 we will have an Epiphany Service of Lessons and Carols in the church. While this type of service is familiar to Episcopalians and Anglicans the world over—the one at King's College, Cambridge is especially famous—it's usually in the context of Christmas, or sometimes Advent. This Epiphany service will celebrate the revelation of Jesus as the son of God, and the sharing of the light of Christ throughout the world.

Following the service we'll burn Christmas greens outdoors; feel free to bring a sprig from your decorations to add to the fire.

A parish supper and chili cook-off take place after the service. This all-ages event will be very similar to our Wonderful Wednesdays suppers and will be donation-based.

The chili cook-off is a good-natured competition that supports our music ministry. Don't worry—if you compete, you do not need to feed everyone at the parish supper! Folks will enjoy small samples of each batch and "vote" for their favorites by dropping money into cups for each one or by making a donation by credit or debit card. The supper will be prepared by our kitchen staff and volunteers. No reservations are needed for the service. Our previously successful jail ministry at the Richmond Justice Center (the City Jail) was forced to disband during the pandemic. We're grateful to announce that it is coming back in a different form in partnership with Richmond REAL LIFE. This nonprofit organization has been serving the Richmond community for a decade, providing treatment and housing for people seeking support after being released from jail or prison. Our team will conduct Bible study based on Scripture passages read during our worship services here. We will also offer Holy Eucharist. John Gayle, a St. Stephen's parishioner, was instrumental in founding our ministry to the incarcerated. He has said, "When we are there sharing our feelings and thoughts with those who are suffering, the mutual humanity is so pervasive, it's as if Jesus is in the room."

John is leading this new effort and we seek other men to join him in visiting the men of Richmond REAL LIFE. If this effort is successful, we plan to expand the ministry to include visits by female parishioners with formerly incarcerated women.

Bible study to focus on Acts of the Apostles

THURSDAYS, JANUARY 22-MARCH 12 | 10 A.M.

Written by the author of the Gospel of Luke, the Acts of the Apostles continues the story of Jesus' followers. Acts begins by describing the events, confusion, and challenges followers of Jesus experienced immediately following his death. In the opening verses of each book, the writer states his objective: to write "about all that Jesus did and taught" (Acts 1:1) "so that you may know the truth" (Luke 1:4). Beginning on January 22, the Thursday morning Bible study will dive into Acts and explore the earliest days of the church. We meet in Room 14; all are welcome and no previous experience is required.

Remember that our farmers market is open year-round except the Saturday after Christmas. Yesterday we began our hybrid indoor-outdoor market, when many vendors move into the fellowship hall while some choose to remain outdoors. We will continue this pattern through February. Everyone will be back outside in March. Remember, our market is open rain or shine. You can find fresh, local greens, root vegetables, squash, mushrooms, eggs, bread, meat, soups and stews, jewelry, and so much more, all winter long. And since our farmers harvest their crops (especially greens) just before the market, they will stay fresh much longer than grocery store produce.
